Earlier this year, Bishop Terence Brain – Bishop Emeritus of Salford – celebrated his diamond jubilee and spoke to our vocations team to share his memories, thoughts, and findings from 60 happy years of ministry.



Childhood aspirations are fond memories for each and every one of us, but sadly, our dreams of becoming an astronaut, spy, or president of the United States rarely come to fruition in adult life.

But Bishop Brain's childhood dream of becoming a priest was the exception to prove the rule, as he recalls the first time his vocation stirred in his mind. "When I was little, it was common. It wasn't out of the ordinary at 11 or 12 to say you wanted to be a priest – it was just one stage away from saying you wanted to be a fireman.

I was in Year 6 in primary school and there was a family who lived in the parish where I lived in Coventry and they had a son, who had become a priest with the Missionaries of Africa. It must have been the year he was ordained, and he came back to school and came around the classes and I remember him coming to our class and talking to us about being a priest in Africa. "I remember sitting there thinking, "that's brilliant" – so I went home and told my mother I was going to be a priest and go to Africa. It was a total venture of the imagination but that's the first idea I had about it."

Over the years, influential figures such as an uncle in the priesthood, a priest who prayed with him and brought Holy Communion to him during a long stay in hospital, and a motherly teacher who exuded a sense of holiness and goodness had a subtle but lasting effect on the young Terence Brain.

"My mum – it always starts with your mum", Bishop Brain explained, "I'd told her about wanting to be a priest and I must have mentioned it to her more than once in different ways because she asked me if I was serious about it. But, you see, at the age of 11 or 12, what does serious mean? What do you know about it? So, it wasn't set in stone, but she went to see the parish priest and asked for his advice."

Eventually, it was decided that he would apply for The Bishop's Scholarship, and after passing the exam, he was enrolled at Cotton College, which was a school run by the Archdiocese of Birmingham in North Staffordshire.

The school provided a top-quality education for boys in an environment that was Church run, with around 25% of pupils expressing a desire to join the priesthood.

Bishop Brain recalled: "There were 17 boys in my class wanting to become priests. Two of us were ordained. You see, we were 11 - the time you grew up, reached 15 and got pimples, it didn't make sense anymore. Some found the academic side challenging, others came across other circumstances that drew them away – there was no one reason."

After six years at Cotton College, Bishop Brain went to seminary before being ordained in 1964. "I never had any doubts. It sounds arrogant but I never doubted I would be ordained a priest – I never expected any of the things that happened after, but I never doubted I would be a priest." Bishop Brain's first appointment was at the parish of St Gregory's in Longton, Stoke on Trent. Just one year after the start of the Second Vatican Council, the beginning of Fr Brain's ministry was a time of incredible upheaval and change for priests and parishioners alike.

Reflecting on this time, Bishop Brain said: "I wasn't a clerical sort of priest. For me it was about being involved with the people. I like



people - they're made in the image and likeness of God! It's about encouraging them to fulfil themselves by helping them meet God and helping them get to know him." This idea of finding fulfilment and closeness with God is highlighted by Bishop Brain as a key part of the discernment process, who recommends a

simple, quiet pattern of prayerful conversation with God to unpick that sense of vocation. He said: "Talk to him about it. Just say, "Thank you for today. Did I go where you wanted me to go today, God? Did I come up to scratch? I need you to guide me; I need you to talk to me. And the trouble is, God, I don't really know how to listen to

about having that confidence to be yourself for God. Just be you and he'll look after all the other bits."

A few years into his ministry, Bishop Brain took up the position of hospital chaplain at Dudley Road Hospital, Birmingham. He said: "When you're in hospital, you're not in your own space anymore: you're in someone else's space, you're not in control. In hospital it all looks structured and efficient and without you being involved. This can make us feel anxious, isolated. So, I learnt to say "Hello" and "Goodbye" in the languages of the patients - many of whom did not speak English as a first language - as a simple way of acknowledging them as persons."

Bishop Brain shared one story of a salt-of-the-earth woman who was in hospital for many number of weeks. Greeting Fr Brain each visit with a broad Birmingham accent, she became a familiar face during his visits, always saying: "Don't you worry about me, Father, you go and talk to one of them that needs you. I'll let you know if I need you." Repeating this same exchange week in, week out, Fr Brain never expected the woman to say any more until one day she stopped him and said: "You know that prayer you're going to say for me, Father? You can say it now, I think I'm going to need it now." She died that night.

"It's little things like that over your life that takes the arrogance out of you," Bishop Brain said. "You think you know it all because you've read the books for so long, but you don't."

These human interactions became the hallmark of Bishop Brain's vocation as he championed a priesthood that puts people, love, and service at the Centre of the ministry. He explained: "The professors at seminary would say not to read your theology as an academic exercise. You can get enthused from the academic stimulus of working out the logic but that's not what theology is. Theology is meeting God. You've got to meet God. "You find people in your life who have met God and they've never even opened a theology book. They might not even read scripture all that much but recite an Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory Be for their prayers. But they've met him."

This virtue of accompaniment and sense of walking with people is a legacy of his priesthood that followed Bishop Brain to Salford, as he worked to manage the structure and organisation of parish communities in our diocese. Acknowledging that the success of any organisation – including our own diocese – relies on a sense of collaboration, Bishop Brain was keen to ensure the happiness of his

priests to nurture the best of their ministry. He said: "You try your best to consult people and work with people, so I'd ask priests if they could go to this parish or that parish, but I'd say to them: "You need to love your people. If you can't love them, you won't be happy, you won't want to be there with them. And if you don't want to be there with them, you'll never lead them anywhere."

Although retired now, Bishop Brain remains a popular and welcome face across the diocese, offering a helping hand to his parish priest whenever called upon, and cherishing the connections and relationships he forged over 17 years at the helm of our diocese.

Reflecting back over 60 years of priesthood – and back to that very first sense of calling as a primary school pupil – Bishop Brain laughs as he describes his ministry as "happy, enlightening, and rewarding." He said: "It's brought me contentment as a person. If I were to speak to someone discerning now, I would say, "Don't be afraid of the priesthood – don't think you won't be happy. If you embrace it, you will be. It won't necessarily be easy – we all have our crosses but it's our crosses that make life stimulating, because we have to find ways around the problems we face."

"When I look back over my life, if I'm honest I've got to say I've enjoyed it! I mean there are all the ups and downs of life but someone said to me the other week: "60 years - it's a long time. Would you do it again?" And I said, "Oh yes, I would. But I'd try and do it better."

Mystery or Not

On attending a weekday Mass recently, I was approached by a long-standing stalwart and parishioner about the statue of Our Lady and the infant Jesus situated in the 'apse' at the rear of the church, overlooking the nearby graveyard.

Apparently, many moons ago, at a Parish meeting (A.G.M.) the question of moving the said statue was discussed by the then parish priest, Father Gordon Beattie (1992-1999)

For some reason or another my mum in her usual "diminutive" way, strongly opposed the idea. Who won the argument? Well, the statue is still there today over 30 years later. What her argument was, who knows. I know it was never a talking point when the family met.

There must not have been any 'bad blood' between Father Gordon and my mum as following his 'exile' to Parbold in 1999 she used to attend Mass there occasionally courtesy of the most expensive taxi service in Lostock Hall (Family Joke!)



The photo attached to this article depicts “The Immaculate Conception” (Feast Day December 8th) The only difference between the image on the prayer-card and the statue of Our Lady in Church is the infant Jesus.

On scanning many images of ‘The Immaculate Conception’ on websites, some have Our Lady with the Infant Jesus some do not.

There are however many similarities. The halo of stars above and around Our Lady’s head and shoulders and her Standing on the Moon and the Serpents head. By standing on the Moon, she

shows that she is more powerful than the God of Darkness.

In some parts of Christian Konography, the crescent Moon under Our Lady’s feet is usually a symbol of her perpetual virginity.

There are many similarities with statues of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Maybe the statue in the Apse isn’t “The Immaculate Conception” or “Our Lady of Guadalupe” but another thing altogether.

Can anyone throw a light on the matter? Was anyone at the Parish gathering way back in the 90’s (last century!)

As my mum is no longer with us, I am unable to ask her what her beef was about the removal of the statue. It must have been quite an important reason for her to challenge Father Gordon. Maybe we will never know.

I never miss my 5 minutes or so at the statue of Our Lady and the infant Jesus. It is my go-to place prior to Mass every time I attend Tardy St Gerard’s. My mum’s influence?

My Mother - Eulogy by Stephen Catterall



It is my responsibility, honour and privilege to speak here today. We have mixed emotions it is okay to feel sad, upset or even happy, in a way mum has lived 90 years in preparation for this day.

If mum was able to speak today I am sure this is what she would say.

Thank you for coming and just continue to love one another and also happy birthday to her great grandchild Alfie and well done Catrina for bringing a new life into the world.

Mum usually stands here reading, it was mum and dads life this church and the community, I actually painted this

church with my dad.

Lets start at the beginning, Catherine Brierley married John Lucas a Warrant Officer in the British Army at Fulwood Barracks, he was a physical training instructor, he was very physically fit, he was a fantastic dad, they had 6 children, Bill, Josephine, Joan, Winifred, John and Robert.

They lived at 14 Oakland Street, behind Coopers Butchers, Bamber Bridge. They had a happy childhood and mum spoke of many happy memories to us as children mum said she played hop scotch in the street and when the coal man came she used to bring the washing in so he could deliver the coal, mum remembered getting bathed in a tin bath in front of the fire pretending they were at Blackpool. There was a tipper toilet in the back yard, mum was frightened she would fall down the hole.

Next door lived Sally and Harry Rawcliffe, they had 2 sons Jimmy and Terry, they were nice Catholic people, most Saturdays they went to confession along with mums family.

When the war broke out mum was still a young girl and remembered queuing for oranges and taking ration books to the shops.

Mum enjoyed her education, she was taught by nuns, she enjoyed

writing and reading and learnt shorthand this was useful in her working life. She could write 120 words a minute. Mum passed her scholarship then went to the Harris Institute on a BBMS bus.

When mum left school she went to work for Thomas Moss and Sons at Lostock Hall in the office of the mill.

Mum met dad at a church dance, mum told me dad was a good dancer even though he had a lame foot due to polio. They went on bike rides down country lanes, they were well matched together, soul mates. It must be great to find your soul mate and have a happy full life together as a lot of you know I tried twice before I found mine.

They decided to get married on the 19th February 1955 just before Lent, it meant a lot to both of them to have a Nuptial Mass, this meant they could have Communion. The wedding was on a Saturday, mums sisters were her bridesmaids, they made their own dresses. Leo Walton was dads best man.

They started married life in a rented room on Collins Road, Bamber Bridge. They really wanted their own house and to start a family. They saved hard, mum always said to us we only got we could afford we never went into debt for things if we couldn't afford it, we didn't get it.

They managed to buy a house 21 Wateringpool Lane, Pat and Christine lived there, mum and dad had their eye on number 22 across the road. It was coming up for sale and they saved hard and bought it. I was born and then Mark was actually born in the front room while I watched Dr Who.

That house was great, it had a large garden, but it wasn't just a house mum and dad made it a loving home. Mum never complained, letting us have chicken pens, pigeon lofts, building tree houses, Wendy houses for the girls, summer times were great, walking to meet cousins, camping in the garden. We had so many happy times with all our extended family and friends.

One memory I have, I found funny as a child Father Forbes used to call round to discuss with dad the music for the next Mass, on this occasion he had on a brand new wool coat, my mum hung it over the banister, dad and Father were practicing, mum was making a drink in the kitchen and our family dog was chewing the sleeves on Father Forbes coat, mums face was a picture, she ran upstairs for her sewing box. I remember her folding it over to stitch, she explained to Father what had happened, Father Forbes was very nice about the incident, but I could see the funny side because as he waved good

bye I could see the elbows.

Only once we were all at school did mum return to work as a senior clerical officer at the Probation Service. Mum learnt to drive at this time of life.

When we all started with families well it all starts again, the big garden came back into play, many children's parties, family parties, mum and dad loved their grandchildren as if they were their own.

In 2016 we lost our dad, most of us thought mum wouldn't be long after him, they had a real strong bond but we all kept going looking after her for 7 years until mum needed 24/7 care, this is where Coote Lane Care Home was looking after mum in the last 12 months of her life.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all, everyone here today and Father Colin, Ian Wilde Funerals, the grave digger, the organist, caterers, choir, the Parochial Centre or as I know it my first class room. Rebecca for her beautiful Poem, Coote Lane Care Home and David Walker for the Funeral Booklets.

Over the next few weeks dad will introduce mum to John the Baptist, Mary, Joseph, all the old Popes, Adam & Eve and all the Saints. I'll want to speak to Brunel, Richard Arkwright and George Stevenson.

The General Election

The Saint Vincent de Paul Society and CAFOD have joined forces to invite parishes to find out candidates' views on the issues that we care about as Christians. The church tells us that "All citizens ought to be aware of their right and duty to promote the common good by casting their votes". Several weeks ago when on a zoom meeting delivered by CAFOD we were shocked to hear that over eight million people in the UK either cannot, or choose not to vote in elections. If we don't cast our vote we can't grumble when politicians don't deliver on the issues we consider important.

Remember, you must have photo ID such as a bus pass, driving licence or passport to vote in person but if this is problematic please register for a postal vote, which must be done before 22nd June. Before casting our vote it is essential that we try to become as informed as possible about the views of our local candidates so we can make an informed choice.

So what are the issues which CAFOD and the SVP are concerned about and which we can question candidates on the doorstep? We won't of course be able to address all of them but perhaps we can focus on two or three! These are only initial suggestions, I'm sure people are perfectly capable of making up their own!

1. **The cost of living crisis:** - Two million people currently use Foodbanks- What are your plans to tackle the cost of living crisis in our area and nationally?

2. **Migration and Asylum:** - So many are dying tragically in the channel trying to reach safety in the UK. Once here they face the possibility of being indefinitely detained and deported to Rwanda.

If elected, will you champion the right to safe and legal routes for those needing to flee their homes rather than leave vulnerable people prey to people smugglers?

3. **Food systems:** - 2.4 billion people don't have regular access to food and the global food system needs transforming so we have a new agricultural model to support small scale farmers who practise sustainable techniques.

If elected, will you work towards ensuring an end to hunger both in the UK and globally?

4. **Climate:** - The climate crisis is already causing mass displacement of people across the world and the UK, as one of the largest historic emitters of greenhouse gasses, has a particular responsibility to keep temperature rises to below 1.5C.

What will you do to ensure a transition away from fossil fuels and that the UK finally ends all new oil, coal and gas projects?

These are 4 of the 8 issues at the moment (go to website mentioned below for full list or speak to Margaret) but obviously other issues close to the heart of Christians which you may want to question candidates about such as 'Assisted Dying' and the reduction of Abortion from 24 to 22 weeks.

Please keep your eye on the weekly notices in case there are actions we can take as a parish which will require your support, e.g attending hustings etc.

If there is an Emergency and no Priest is available for the weekend Masses, the Eucharistic Ministers, particularly those who have been trained, will perform a Holy Communion Service and this will replace the Mass. Please note that this is **Only in an Emergency** and there is no time to arrange for another priest or no other is Priest is available.

At least six months notification of Marriage is required. Pre-marriage instruction is mandatory and organised by the Diocese. Please telephone 335387 to arrange Notification and Preparation.
